It is time to choose your courses for next school year! It is important that you put a lot of thought into this process. You are responsible for selecting the appropriate courses for graduation. This guide will hopefully answer some registration questions you may have and make the registration process smoother.

REGISTRATION PROCESS

All students will select their courses by logging into their PowerSchool account. Simply click on "Class Registration".

Online registration will be open from 8:00am March 1st-Noon March 4th. You may register anytime during that time frame.

Students not registered by March 4th will be scheduled to register during the school day during the week of March 8th.

There are four classes in the fall semester and four classes in the spring semester. During registration you are selecting classes for the entire school year.

Rising 9th-11th grade students will need to select a full schedule's worth of classes plus two alternates. Simply put, you will be selecting 10 classes total (8 classes and 2 alternates). The computer will schedule your core classes (English, math, science, history) first. Then it will schedule your elective classes around your core classes. If there is a conflict the computer may pull from your alternate classes to fill your schedule. It is important that you pick alternate classes that you want to take because there is a good chance that you may be scheduled for one or both alternate classes.

Rising seniors will be required to select as many classes as they plan on taking during their senior year. Which could range from 1 to 8 classes.

Note: There are some year-long classes. Example: AP English, AP Biology, AP Math. These classes are noted as year long on your course selection sheet.

Honors vs Standard Courses

What should I take?

If you are currently taking standard courses & making 90% or higher, consider taking honors level courses. If you are currently in honors level classes & making an 80-90% you should consider remaining in honors classes. Students making 90% in honors courses should consider AP courses. If you have questions about a specific class, talk to your teacher in that subject area for their recommendations.

What is CCP/Dual Enrollment?

Career & College Promise (CCP) allows Juniors/Seniors the opportunity to earn college credit while in high school. CCP requires a separate registration.

More info will be sent to student emails on how to register.

If you are a rising Junior and plan to take college classes, you will still register for 10 classes at CBA. Your counselor will adjust your schedule at a later time.

Note for Athletes:

To be eligible for athletics, you must earn a minimum of 3 credits during the semester that precedes your sport's season. To remain eligible during the season, you must be enrolled in a minimum of 2 classes. Early Out/Late Arrival is not a class or a credit! Remember, absences & promotion also affect your eligibility.
